Associate Prof Dr Muhammad Aziz Rahman

Dr Aziz Rahman is an experienced academic and public health physician with a track record of leadership in research and community projects, focusing on different aspects of public health and health promotion, securing funding, producing high-quality research publications, supervising higher degree research students, and mentoring early mid-career researchers. Dr Rahman has been providing leadership in teaching, both at undergraduate and postgraduate levels, in Australia and internationally.

Dr Rahman’s research includes work on tobacco, non-communicable diseases, global burden of diseases, nursing, health promotion, gender differences in health outcomes, outbreak investigations, mental health, Indigenous health, and the health and wellbeing of disadvantaged, rural and multicultural populations. He has published more than 90 research papers in highly ranked multidisciplinary journals with more than 18,000 citations and h-index 35. He has contributed to more than \$7.9 million in funding success in his academic career.

Dr Rahman has worked with multidisciplinary teams and stakeholders and taken part in public health projects in international settings. He is the Co-Convenor for the Health Promotion Special Interest Group at Public Health Association of Australia (PHAA), and an editorial board member of several reputed international journals. He recently joined Universitas Airlangga, Surabaya, as an Adjunct Professor at the Faculty of Public Health.
